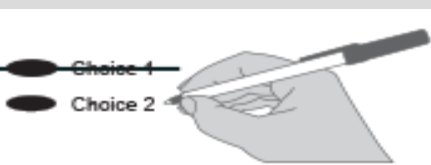
How to vote

Initiatives to the People

Initiative Measure No. 1631

Initiative Measure No. 1631 concerns pollution. This measure would charge pollution fees on sources of greenhouse gas pollutants and use the revenue to reduce pollution, promote clean energy, and address climate impacts, under oversight of a public board.

Initiative Measure No. 1634

Initiative Measure No. 1634 concerns taxation of certain items intended for human consumption. This measure would prohibit new or increased local taxes, fees, or assessments on raw or processed foods or beverages (with exceptions), or ingredients thereof, unless effective by January 15, 2018, or generally applicable.

Initiative Measure No. 1639 concerns firearms. This measure would require increased background checks, training, age limitations, and waiting periods for sales or delivery of semiautomatic assault rifles; criminalize noncompliant storage upon unauthorized use; allow fees; and enact other provisions.

Castle Rock School Dist. No. 401 Proposition 1

Facility Improvement General Obligation Bonds

The Board of Directors of Castle Rock School District adopted Resolution No. 2018-80 concerning this proposition. To enhance the education of Castle Rock students the proposition authorizes the District to construct and equip a new Middle School Campus, renovate and modernize the High School, renovate and modernize the Elementary School and improve the district's safety, security and technology systems, issue \$42,375,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum of 25 years, and levy additional property taxes annually to repay the bonds, as provided in Resolution No. 2018-80.

Toledo School District No. 237 Proposition No. 1

Bonds to Construct School Facilities - \$7,000,000

The Board of Directors of Toledo School District No. 237 approved a proposition for bonds. This proposition would authorize the District to acquire, construct and equip a new building for Toledo High School; to issue \$7,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum term of 21 years, and to levy excess property taxes annually to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 2017-18-16.

Fire Protection District No. 1 (Onalaska Fire Department) Proposition 1

Bonds for Fire Station

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Lewis County Fire Protection District No. 1 (Onalaska Fire Department) adopted Resolution No. 2018-08, concerning a proposition to support fire, rescue and emergency medical services. This proposition would authorize Onalaska Fire Department to: construct a new fire station on land already owned by the Fire Department on Alexander Road between State Route 508 and 2nd Street southwest to replace the existing fire station; acquire firefighting and emergency medical service equipment and apparatus; issue no more than \$1,700,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 2018-08.

Transportation District

County Wide Expansion of Public Transportation Services Sales and Use Tax Levy

The Board of Lewis County Commissioners adopted Resolution No. 18-230 concerning a sales and use tax to finance public transportation within boundaries of the Lewis Public Transit Benefit Area (LPTBA). If approved, this proposition would authorize a sale and use tax of two-tenths of one percent (0.2%) to be collected, in addition to any other taxes authorized by law, within the boundaries of the Lewis Public Transit Benefit Area (LPTBA), of all taxable retail sales in accordance with RCW 82.14.045 to fund operation, maintenance and capital needs of the Lewis Public Transit Benefit Area (LPTBA) as identified in its comprehensive transit plans.
