



Follow instructions on the lavender envelope to return ballot. Mail or deposit it in the drop box located in the Auditor's office at 351 NW North St, Chehalis, from 8 AM to 5 PM Monday-Friday and on Election Day from 7 AM to 8 PM. Accessible voting equipment will be available 20 days prior to election day. If you have changed your permanent residence address, call this office to ensure the ballot you receive in future elections contains the races and issues for your resident address. If you have any questions about your eligibility to vote in this election, please contact this office.




